





If bands are circles,




and tribes, ovals;



chiefdoms, trapezoids




and states, triangles;




and each level is arranged according to the increasing social complexity of its political system, as illustrated by a concordant geometrical hierarchy featuring shapes representative of the distribution of Power inherent in each system; furthermore, if we allow that every political system in the world today can be categorized as one of four, and that every place in the world today is ruled by at least one political system,


then the future of the world—that is, the evolution of the state—must be a multi-hexagonal arrangement in the tradition of the honeycomb, which when conformed to our planet’s spherical nature, produces something very much like a soccer ball:




where each hexagon, as its own entity but having six sides, interfaces with six other hexagons, forming the complex political system by which each hexagon is ruled,




such that each hexagon, when extended at its constitutive interfaces, overlaps adjacent hexagons;



where these overlaps occur, Power is transferred, to the effect that Hexagon 1 rules 1/6 of hexagons 2 and 3 (and 4, 5, 6, and 7 for that matter)



but is itself entirely ruled by its 6 interfaces [see top-central hexagon below, previously black]—



the idea being that within this model of government, Corruption becomes not only ill-advised, but nigh impossible; for when Yellow rules Green, Green likewise rules Yellow, and the eye-for-an-eye mentality would hinder both Yellow and Green, possibly to the point of interfering with, for example, Yellow's ruling of Orange, in which case Orange would then retaliate against Yellow,

though at all times Orange and Green are prevented from collaborating against Yellow, as they have no mutual interests,

leading to the likely conclusion that only the multi-hexagonal political system could and would instill peace and equality,

and most importantly, actually be a place I would want to live:
not capitalist, nor communist, but communal.
